



### NCTCOG Overview

- The <u>North Central Texas Council of Governments</u> (NCTCOG) is a voluntary association of, by and for local governments, established to assist in regional planning.
- NCTCOG's purpose is to strengthen both the individual and collective power of local governments and to help them recognize regional opportunities, eliminate unnecessary duplication, and make joint decisions.
- NCTCOG's programs and departments encompass transportation planning, environment and development, aging and disability resources, emergency preparedness, demographic research, regional training, criminal justice, 911 emergency numbers, a regional police academy, and more.
- The counties we serve include: Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Kaufman, Navarro, Palo Pinto, Parker, Rockwall, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise.



# Environment & Development Overview

- The <u>Environment & Development</u> department guides and promotes collaboration among public entities to progressively address common environmental issues and development challenges facing them due to our region's rapid growth and urbanization.
- We work with over 230 member governments, including the 16 counties, numerous cities, school districts, and special districts.
- We have six strategic initiatives for Sustainable Environmental Excellence: Materials Management, Natural Resources, Public Works, Regional Codes, Watershed Management, and Development Excellence.

- Defend Your Drains North Texas is a public education campaign aimed at informing North Central Texas residents on what should and should not go down the drain.
- Funded through the Wastewater and Treatment Education Roundtable, a voluntary cost-sharing program at NCTCOG, Defend Your Drains North Texas focuses on the following topic areas:
  - Don't pour Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG) down the drain
  - Don't dump paint, household chemicals, or excess cleaning products down the drain
  - Don't flush wipes, paper towels, hygiene products, or other items (even if they're labeled as "flushable")
  - Only flush the "Three P's" (pee, poop, and toilet paper)



- Wipes, paper towels, and other hygiene products are designed to be strong and not break down when wet or used.
- Because of this, they don't break down in pipes like toilet paper and cause major blockages in your home's pipes or get caught in machinery at the wastewater treatment plant!
- Defend your drains by only disposing of these types of products in the trash before they cause unpleasant and expensive repairs or increases to your water bills!







- If you pour Fats, Oils, Greases (FOG)
  down the drain, they will harden and
  cling to the walls in your household pipes
  or city sewer lines.
- Once the FOG has hardened, it reduces water flow and can quickly cause a sewage backup into your home or neighborhood.
- Protect your pipes and never put any FOG down the drain! Instead, pour or scrape remaining FOG from the pain into a container and put it in the trash.



- As part of Defend Your Drains North Texas, NCTCOG partners with American BioSource and entities in the region to offer an Annual Holiday Grease Roundup, in which additional FOG collection sites are made available during the holiday season
  - Participants receive free marketing materials, including a social media toolkit, press release, bill insert, and more
  - Participants that do not have an established grease program can also receive free grease containers, along with pick up and collection of the container from American BioSource
- During the 2021 Holiday Grease Roundup, 41
  participants hosted 70 collection sites and collected
  8,445 gallons of grease!



## Time to Recycle





- Time to Recycle is an educational effort that encourages North Central Texas residents to properly dispose of or recycle items, reducing the impact on the region's landfills.
- Time to Recycle hosts a Recycling Drop-Off Locator map, in which you can search recycling locations by materials and zip code.
- This website also includes additional resources covering topics such as composting, household hazardous waste, creative reuse ideas, and more!

# Time to Recycle

- In FY2018-2019, NCTCOG created a Regional Recycling Education Campaign based on results from regional waste characterizations and aimed to teach North Central Texas residents how to "recycle more and recycle right."
- This campaign, titled "Know What To Throw," included the redesign of Time to Recycle, the "Do you Know What to Throw" quiz, and promotional activities, such as billboards, print ads, radio and movie theater ads, and more.
- To continue the "Know What To Throw" campaign, NCTCOG's Recycle Roundtable has developed monthly coordinated topics, informing residents of items that <u>should</u> and <u>should not</u> be recycled.



- NCTCOG staff forwards the report to the correct jurisdiction, so you don't have to!
- This website also aims to increase the awareness of the hazards of illegally dumped trash, as well as to encourage citizens to actively participate in local recycling and solid waste programs.

- In 2021, 658 reports were forwarded to the proper authorities.



### Why We're Focused On Litter

Is an eyesore

Harmful to wildlife

Increases flooding risk

Creates water quality issues

Approximately 362 million pieces of litter accumulate on Texas roads each year.
Recyclables, such as beverage containers and paper, make up 25% of it.

Roadside litter, across the U.S., is down 54% in the past decade to an estimate of 23.7 billion pieces. However, litter along waterways is estimated to be at 23.7 billion pieces.

Trash, packaging, and improperly disposed waste from sources on land accounts for 80% of the marine debris found on beaches during cleanups and surveys.

   resident, during a set timeframe
- 2022 Challenge timeframe:
   March 1<sup>st</sup> May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022





#### **How It Works**

#### **Communities & Local Govts.**

Sign-up on the website for their community to officially participate. Once registered, they will be recognized as a participating community on the website and can post their cleanup events on the calendar.

#### Individual participants

Aren't limited to only cleaning up at organized local events. Any cleanup of litter and trash in their local park, neighborhood, or on their block in which they live or work that is collected can be reported and counted towards the community in which they collected the litter.

**Note:** All cleanup data by communities and individuals must be for activity that occurred during the challenge timeframe of March 1<sup>st</sup> to May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022 and must be logged by June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022!

#### **How It Works**

- Any type of litter cleanup activity conducted during the Cleanup Challenge timeframe counts towards the overall totals for each city where the cleanup activity occurred.
- Everyone can participate! This includes individuals, families, faith groups, Scouts, HOA's, businesses, nonprofits, environmental groups, and Keep Texas Beautiful affiliates.
- Informal cleanup activities, such as collecting litter on a daily walk or jog through neighborhoods and parks, also count towards the goal of removing as much trash and litter from our environment as possible!
- Each of these activities can be logged to help push cities closer towards the goal of being the community that collected the most trash and litter during our Cleanup Challenge timeframe.
- Each cleanup that is logged is connected to the community in which it took place.



### Join The Community Cleanup Challenge!

#### Joining the Challenge – Individuals:

- Pickup litter at any time in your neighborhood, community, or place of work
- Go to the Log Cleanup page on NTCCC website
- Click "Log Cleanup Event" (you will be routed to the <u>Texas Litter Database</u>)
- Enter your litter collection data on Texas Litter Database
- Enter CCC22 in the external ID field toward the bottom of the report
- Congratulations, you just helped make our environment in North Texas cleaner and healthier!
- Check out our <u>Quick Guide for Using the Texas Litter Database</u> to help walk you through how to enter your data
- Note: When participating in an organized cleanup event, please do not report your individual litter collection data. The event coordinators should report data for the event as a whole.

# Texas SmartScape



- Texas SmartScape is a landscape program that has been designed to be "smart" for North Central Texas. It is based on water-efficient landscape principles, promoting the use of native and adaptive plants suited to our region's soil, climate, and precipitation that don't require much—if any—additional irrigation, pesticides, fertilizer, or herbicides to thrive.
- The two main goals of the program:
  - Improve stormwater runoff quality
  - Conserve local water supplies
- Other tangential benefits to a SmartScape friendly landscape:
  - Supports our pollinators and local ecosystems
  - Saves time and money



# Texas SmartScape



#### Benefits of Texas SmartScape and Native and Adaptive Plants

- ☑ Water Conservation
  - Requires less water
- ☑ Water Quality
  - Requires little to no fertilizers or pesticides
  - Improves stormwater runoff quality
- ☑ Better Suited to Variability of Texas Climate
- ☑ Supports Pollinators
- ☑ Reduced Costs/Saves Money


#### **Plant Database**

# Texas SmartScape Tips



For a Texas SmartScape friendly landscape:

#### 1) Plan and Design

• Start with the end in mind. What are your needs and desires when envisioning your perfect yard? Prioritize your needs and create a plan.

#### 2) Reduce Turf

Less is more. Less turf means more time for you to enjoy your lawn and reduce watering costs.

#### 3) Soil

• Use compost to improve soil health support plant nutrient needs. Compost helps to condition the soil, hold moisture, prevent runoff, reduce erosion, and unlocks nutrients in the soil.

#### 4) Planting

• The right plant in the right place. Use the SmartScape plant database to help select the right plants for your specific needs and aesthetic preferences.

#### 5) Mulch

Mulch beds with approximately 3" of material regularly. Mulch helps reduce evaporation and cools soils in the summer by up to 10 degrees. Mulch also helps reduce erosion, diseases, and prevents weeds from getting a foothold. Leave (mulched) grass clippings on lawn

#### 6) Be Water-Wise

• Water early in morning or between 8 pm – 10 am. Water slowly to avoid runoff; try the <u>cycle and soak</u> method. Audit your irrigation system – fix any leaks or broken heads, adjust direction of sprinkler heads, adjust run times.

#### 7) Maintenance

Maintenance should be minimal with native and adaptive plants once established. If you do encounter problems, try cultural, organic, physical, and mechanical means of pest control instead of chemicals.

#### Pet waste education campaign and photo contest

- Pet waste, if left on the ground, can pose health risks for people and pets
- Pet waste can carry:
  - Parvovirus
  - Bacteria like E. coli
  - Parasites
  - Diseases like Toxocariasis and Giardiasis
- It is NOT a natural fertilizer

- Pet waste can also affect our water quality
- Pet waste and the bacteria it contains can wash into stormdrains from rain, melting snow/ice, and sprinkler runoff
- Stormdrains flow untreated directly into lakes and streams
- Bacteria and decomposing pet waste can make water unsafe for recreation, encourage algae growth, and contribute to fish kills





- How to "Doo the Right Thing" and become a Watershed Protector
  - Flush waste down toilet
  - Bag and toss it in trash can
  - Burry it in a pet waste composter
  - Take bags on your walks
  - Pick up pet waste in yard at least 1x week







- Doo the Right Thing Contest
  - Runs: May 1<sup>st</sup> June 30<sup>th</sup>
  - Take the pledge to cleanup after your pup(s) and enter their photo(s) in the contest




